A Week of Memories and Magic



The event culminated with the symbolic cutting of the graduation cake, marking the end of a memorable chapter in the lives of the students.










Global Perspective Culmination

AS Level Batch 2024: A Dynamic Start






English AS Class Debates the Value of Textbooks in the 21st Century



Of Words And Worlds



Language. A unique code to interpret the world around us. Or does it work the other way round? Can our world-view affect our language?

Research has long shown that our language and thoughts are inextricably connected. So, while your unique cultural context and perceptions influences the way you speak, your language also offers an insight into your values, notions, and beliefs as an individual and a member of a community.

For instance, let us take the statement 'English is as good as Math'. At a superficial level, it looks like an innocent remark signifying that English is equivalent to Math. One only needs to mull over it to unearth the implicit bias towards Math and the attempt to pitch English as the contender for the top-spot.

Closer home, the language Hindi, has three different second-person pronounstu, tum, aap- each marked for age, familiarity and respect accorded to the addressee.Tu can be used for a younger, familiar person while tum shows some amount of respect for age or social position while still retaining the familiarity aspect. Aap, on the other hand, is used for elders to respect their age, superiors to respect their social position and strangers as it creates distance.

Such modifications arose from the uniquely Indian context of interacting in a multi- generational family of close-knit, extended or distant relatives. The unique pronouns (present in other Indian languages as well) also reflect the deeply embedded cultureof respect for age and experience, in the Indian psyche.

In contrast, the second person pronoun 'you' in English remains the same at all levels of age, familiarity and formality.

Equally, cultures with strong social identity like Japan use linguistic practices such as dropping out subject- pronouns. For the Japanese, using pronouns such as 'I' or 'You' acts against their cultural value of not making differentiation between self and others. In Standard English, dropping subject -pronouns would be considered a sacrilege!

Similarly, concepts such as time and space are viewed differently in different cultures, affecting the way one speaks about it. While English speakers view time running horizontally (hence the expression 'turn back to the past' or 'looking ahead at the future'), the Chinese frequently express time metaphors vertically. 'Last month' is 'Shàng gè yuè' where 'Shàng' means 'Up' whereas 'Next month' is 'Xià gè yuè' – where 'Xià' means 'Down.'


Conversely, the Himba tribe of Nambia is an example of language restricting or sharpening (depending on the way it is viewed) one's perceptions. The tribe, with a unique ability to spot even a subtlest change in the shade of green, often fails to distinguish blue from green. Surprising? Not really, when we learn that blue is categorized the same as green in Himba language, and hence is not really considered a different colour.

Does this mean that speakers who speak in two or more languages see the world differently and have different personalities? Certainly. Many bilinguals often report of being a different person the moment they switch languages. You can even experience this yourself when you change over from speaking the standard form of English with your teacher to speaking the more informal, slang version with your friends during break time. You would even subconsciously change your body language, gestures and mannerisms.

Given this understanding, one can definitely assert that language is an integral part of our human experience. It shapes us and defines us. A small effort towards understanding its nuances will go a long way in understanding who we really are.








Science Exploration Quest


Exploring History Through the TOK Lens
